## Roy's Reflections

This morning, August 18th, I drove my life partner, Jean Lamer, to the Harrisburg Airport and said "Goodbye." She was boarding her plane back to Atlanta. I took the escalator to the second floor and looked back one last time. There she was in the security line looking up at me. We both waved. That was all it took for me to turn toward the parking garage and feel a wave of sadness wash over me. I could not hold back the tears - didn't want to - as I walked to my car.

Jean and I have been married for 29 years this weekend. She and I are inseparable. We share more interests, and have more common taste in things like music and the arts and wines, than any couple I know. The only other time we have been separated for periods of weeks was when I served the Augusta, GA, UU Church. But that city was only 2 ½ hours away from our home in Atlanta. We saw each other rather frequently; at least two weekends a month. That will not be the case with this ministry. Once a month will be the best we can achieve.

Why do I tell you this?

Well, today is the deadline for the newsletter and I feel compelled to meet that deadline. In doing so I don't want to switch off my feelings and navigate around them to offer some expert bit of wisdom that might be especially timely as you and I start out together as congregation and interim minister. I want to be present with you from who I actually am and what I authentically feel. I ask the same of you. I don't mean we need to get all emotional and spread around fear and anxiety, anger and conflict because "Well, that's what I'm feeling!" No, I don't mean that at all. Instead I mean it is important that we not bypass the 'feelings conversations' in order to get to 'what happened' or the 'what needs to happen' conversations. Feelings are central to the health of a congregation's life; honest, deeply held feelings.



To me (and to those psychologists I draw upon often) feelings touch into our depths, the realm I like to refer to as 'soul.' I do not mean some religious concept of soul. I mean that realm of human experience that is intimate with our bodies, but is accessed through the wisdom of our hearts; both our struggles and strengths. Here I speak of emotional pain and deep-seated memories that evoke yearnings for healing and hope. I speak also of passions, interests, and personal gifts of talent,

skill and insight. I think of deep, soulful feelings as the ground of our beings and the source of our 'becomings.' This I contrast with emotions that stir around us - at work, in friendships, in families, in society - and create a vicious vortex of fear and frenzied agitation that lacks grounding. Dare I use this image? Emotions resemble 'free radicals' in our relational lives. They easily pull us away from the authentic ground of deep, authentic feelings.

My ministry addresses both of these. I help you become aware of the frenzy that pulls outward, flinging us centrifugally away from our centers (and each other). There are good tools to assist us with this. I also help you become aware of the silence of the deep center, where

feelings can ground us in the presence of love's wisdom. There are wonderful tools for that as well.

Let us touch our depths. Jean's parting this morning brought this out. I offer it to you.

Last evening at the board meeting, I shared a poster that included some of the major board accomplishments in this past fiscal year. I wanted us to stop and take a breath and know that a lot of good work had been done. I believe it is important to pause and appreciate what has been done, looking at the glass as half full before we move forward and focus on the glass as half empty.

Some of the listed projects were: (1) the renovated sanctuary (which could easily be identified as the sum of many smaller projects), (2) reaching our financial stewardship goal, (3) planning for the memorial garden, (4) applying for and receiving scholarship tuition money for Healthy Congregations, JPD Conference, & GA Conference, and (5) hiring Rev. Roy as our Interim Minister, (6) offering a wonderful celebration for our closure with Judy & Duane, and (7) beginning the process to develop an endowment program for UUCV.

From the informational meeting we had about beginning an endowment program, we have received notice that Kit Franklin has designated an endowment to UUCV. Thank you, Kit. You are a leader among leaders. Your designated endowment, along with the generous music endowment made by the Laws, gives a hopeful start to what we expect may provide security for UUCV in the future.

This fiscal year will largely be focused on who we are and who we want to become. It will be an introspective time—identifying what we are proud of and simultaneously looking to see what we want to improve or develop.

We opened last night's meeting with a quote by Paulo Coelho that seems so relevant: "When we strive to become better than we are, everything around us becomes better too."

## What's Happening Downstairs in Our Dining Room?

This month you may notice a pile of sleeping mats, clear plastic bags stuffed with blankets, and a different arrangement of tables and chairs in the dining area.

What's going on is that UUCV is hosting the CARES Homeless Shelter downstairs for the month of September, and your help is needed.

Carlisle C.A.R.E.S. (Combined Area Resource for Emergency Shelter) is a non-profit agency whose mission is to provide shelter to homeless individuals and families when no other shelter can be found. Each month, a different church provides a safe and comfortable place for our homeless guests to sleep from 9 at night until 7 in the morning. A UUCV Host Volunteer is needed each night from 8:30 to 10 pm to unlock the lower door, turn on the lights, put out a light snack, and greet the CARES volunteers and homeless guests as they arrive. Male and female volunteers are also needed every night to stay with the guests from 8:30 pm to 7:00 am.

## Monday Night

Tonight, despite having a lousy day, guts-wise and pain-wise, Dan was determined to attend choir practice in Boiling Springs. He had been looking forward to it for days. We under-estimated the exertion involved, and Dan ended up more exhausted than ever before in his entire life. Singing while bound in a brace and having not had dinner didn't feel so good, traveling past speeding cars didn't feel so good, having dry heaves on the way home didn't feel so good. Getting back to the nursing home DID feel good, only to face serious disappointment at not being moved from wheelchair to bed for 30 minutes after we arrived. The personnel were busy with others; it is not their fault. But Dan was nauseous, and like I said, so so so very tired.

Geneva Politzer drove us to choir in her wheelchair van -- with great poise and patience. She could teach driving. Thank you, Geneva.

Visitors are welcomed by Dan at Manor Care. He loves when they come. He REALLY loves it when they stay no more than 20 minutes. Otherwise he just gets too tired-- for what he has to do, for what he'd like to be doing, for his family, for healing mind and body. If the sign is up on the door (No Visitors), please honor this. If the sign is not up, keep your eye on the clock. Do this for Dan who very much still wants to see you, and do it for me who will taser you if you don't.

Tonight's outing was humbling for Dan, and I think it also discouraged him a bit. Not me—I know that getting back to regular activities is going to be difficult in twelve different ways and that it must be taken in steps. I know that Dan's body has taken a blow that it will recover from slowly—despite his progress to this point, despite the winning smile, despite the healthy psyche. One's attitude and one's will count for a lot. Energies move mysteriously. But there are also some cold hard facts. I don't shrink from them but neither do they scare me.

## It's a Wonderful Life

Yesterday Gary and Eileen Johnson from Minneapolis visited me, bringing a wonderful lunch from Whole Foods. Gary was my high school classmate; we reconnected in early July at my 40th reunion in Fargo. They were visiting Gary's sister in Alexandria and decided to spend a day coming to visit me.

I was trying to explain to Felicia, the aide who was washing me up this morning, what it has been like in the past six weeks to have reconnected with people from every era and location of my life and to have been bathed in love and compassion from all my family and friends who are here in Pennsylvania. I've been talking and writing to people I grew up with in North Dakota, or went to school with in Providence or Charlottesville, or met in India or England, that I know through Dickinson or the Unitarian church or yoga or Buddhism or through my kids or my wife's family...and many other ways. I've talked to my brother and to cousins and aunts and uncles for the first time in many years.

I realized that I have been given a gift of the sort George Bailey received in "It's a Wonderful Life"—some way of understanding what your life has meant. George thought he was bankrupt, but in the end he realized that he was actually "the richest man in town." He saw that he meant something to a lot of people, that somehow he had helped to make his world a little better place, that he had much for which to be grateful.

I wasn't exactly feeling bankrupt before this accident, but I was at a kind of crossroads, too. In my late 50s, about to be divorced, living alone in an apartment Leslie once called a dump, my son in trouble academically and with the law, frustrated in some ways with my teaching and professional life, barely scraping by financially, and so forth. Not much to complain about by many people's standards, I know. But I didn't feel my life was so wonderful.

And then a little twist of fate, a case of being in the wrong place at the wrong time, and I find myself on the other side of the looking glass seeing my life from a different perspective. It has been a tremendous gift.
